

Florida's state wildlife agency, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), has exclusive authority under the Florida Constitution to protect and manage our state's wild animals. Its decisions affect black bears, panthers, manatees, sea turtles, alligators, cranes and egrets, and the many other animals who call Florida home. Commissioners are appointed by the Governor.

For too long, the FWC has catered to hunters. There are many ways to enjoy wildlife in Florida. The FWC should represent the interests of all Floridians.
